Welcome from the Administrator

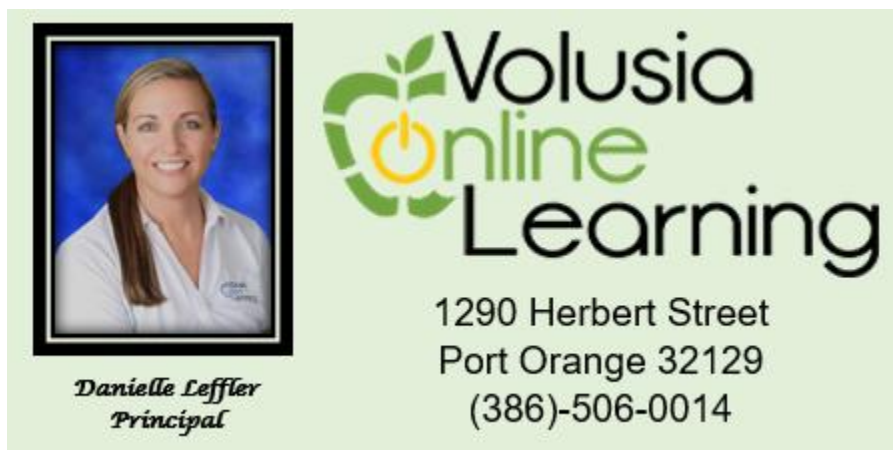
Dear Volusia Online Learning Parents, Guardians, and Students,

What is Virtual School?

A virtual school is one in which the instruction is primarily provided in an online environment. Although students and teachers are separated by time and space, they work together to achieve high levels of learning. The virtual environment allows students to work on a flexible daily schedule at the best time and place for them.

Volusia Online Learning follows the Volusia County School district school calendar. VOL students have access to their online courses 24/7, even during school holidays and breaks. This allows our students to work at any time. Parents will also have 24-hour access to student course progress and grades. The first and last day of school for students as shown on page 2, will also be the first and last day of course access for VOL students. VOL also adheres to the VCS calendar for grade reporting purposes. Please visit [School Calendars](#) for the most up to date calendar as published by Volusia County Schools.

Volusia Online Learning brings together the best technologies, the best curriculum and most importantly, the best of Volusia County teachers, who provide an incredible online experience for your child. We are always committed to educate your student to achieve the highest levels of learning. Teachers and families work together to build relationships that allow for a personalized learning experience for each individual student.

Today, there are many learning options for students. These are some things that make Volusia Online Learning different from other digital learning environments:

- We are a public school with the Volusia County School district. All our teachers are local, providing multiple opportunities for face-to-face meetings with teachers and other virtual students.
- We are aligned to state standards and use online resources, virtual lessons, teacher discussions, and a variety of assessment tools to help follow the course's curriculum. Please note that VOL is a fully online educational environment.
- As part of the online learning experience, virtual students will have the opportunity to attend live lessons with their academic teachers. Teachers will provide students and learning coaches with the dates and times for each course's live lesson. Live lessons require active and engaging participation for all students.
- Students are eligible to participate in a graduation ceremony upon completion of graduation requirements and will receive an accredited Volusia County School diploma awarded from their assigned zoned school.

Communication Expectations

Communication is a key element to the success of the parent- teacher and student- teacher relationship. Parents, students and teachers will discuss student progress at minimum one time per month.

Phone

- Your teachers will provide a phone number for you to contact them when you have questions.
- Please be sure to call them when you need help.
- If your teacher does not answer, be sure to leave a message.
- Virtual school students and parents are required by state statute to participate in a phone conference with the teacher at minimum one time per month.
- Students are required to participate in Discussion Based Assessments with their teachers.

Email

Parent/Learning Coach:

- Establish an email that will be used for school communication, SEPARATE from student's email address
- Check this email, at least once daily
- Allow teachers a maximum of 24 hours to respond on school days

Student:

- Check email twice daily (ideally morning and then again afternoon/night)
- Check in with teachers, at least, once a week
- Allow teachers a maximum of 24 hours to respond on school days

Virtual Classroom

Parent/Learning Coach:

- Great use for parent/teacher conferences (link will be sent to the email we have on file)
- Make sure you know the class meeting times of your student per teacher/per week
- Monitor student during sessions; ensure they are participating accordingly
- Monitor student progress via the course grade book on a weekly basis

Student:

- Make sure you know your teacher's class meeting times. Log in 5-10 minutes early to take care of any technical issues you may experience
- Make sure to attend and participate appropriately and accordingly
- Know the teacher's expectations for live lessons
- Log in only with your own username and do not give your username to anyone else
- Monitor your progress in the course grade book on a weekly basis
- Review teacher feedback on all graded assignments

Regardless of the method used, two-way communication is a key component of virtual school success. If a lack of communication with the parent or learning coach becomes a barrier to student achievement, a face to face conference with administration will be required.

Learning Coach and Parent Responsibilities

Who is a Learning Coach?

Usually, the Learning Coach is the student's parent or guardian, but sometimes the Learning Coach may be someone chosen by the parent or guardian to assist the student. As a Learning Coach, you will play a significant role in your student's online school experience. A critical factor to successful virtual learning for any student is the involvement and support of the Learning Coach.

Virtual school allows the Learning Coach and student more flexibility than you would find in a traditional school. However, Volusia Online Learning has specific expectations for student behavior and participation in addition to those set forth in the Code of Student Conduct. Virtual school students will not learn unless they are in a safe and secure learning environment. As a Learning Coach, you are solely responsible for your child's safety and security. Younger students should never be left at home alone during the school day and older students should be left alone only for limited amounts of time. **It is extremely important that the Learning Coach be consistently available for assistance within the home and the physical presence of the Learning Coach is required.**

As a Learning Coach, your level of involvement will vary based on your student's grade and level of independence. Plan to spend between 2 and 6 hours of instructional time per day with your student, depending on your student's age and learning level. The amount of assistance will vary by grade level, the student's capability to be self-directed, and the student's ability to comprehend learning concepts. It is recommended that you follow these supervision parameters for students by grade level:

Elementary School Assistance level: The parent/legal guardian or designated representative (Learning Coach) will need to provide substantial support to the student throughout the school day and should be with the student physically all day.

Middle School Assistance level: The parent/legal guardian or designated representative (Learning Coach) should be available to provide assistance to the student as needed throughout the day. The parent should be in the same general location all day but may not need to be with the student at all times, depending on the student.

High School Assistance level: Students are expected to perform their schoolwork independently in high school. However, a parent/legal guardian or designated representative (Learning Coach) must still monitor progress and ensure that the student completes required course work. While students may not need constant adult supervision, they must still be in a safe and secure environment.

Additional Parent Responsibilities:

- Monitor online platform(s) for student grades and completion of assigned coursework.
- Complete the monthly call requirement with the teacher, parent and student.
- Be available for teacher conferences, both virtual and face to face. If your response is requested from the staff of Volusia Online Learning, it is an expectation that you will return the phone call or email within a 24-hour time period on school days.
- Review student information and contact information periodically in the portal, and notify the school immediately of any errors, omissions, or changes.
- Monitor the student to ensure that he or she is working on schoolwork or attending virtual lessons (and not playing a game or browsing in another tab or window).
- Provide a specific location for student work that is free of distractions and allows for monitoring of the student's online activities.
- Do not complete work for the student and limit involvement to explaining and encouraging the student to revise anything that is incorrect.

- Provide assistance to the student in trouble-shooting computer problems or answering course related questions. If your student is experiencing technical difficulties which prevent them from completing your assignments on time, they should notify their teachers immediately.

The Learning Coach accepts the responsibility of supervising the student and ensuring that all work is completed and submitted. Learning Coaches who consistently fail to meet their responsibilities will be required to return their student to brick and mortar school. This includes monitoring student grades and attendance, participating in monthly call requirements, providing transportation to the student for face to face learning sessions and testing, and attendance at student conferences.

Curriculum

Volusia Online Learning curriculum aligns to state standards. Volusia Online Learning students will have the opportunity to use online resources, attend virtual lessons and teacher discussions, and use a variety of assessment tools to help follow the course’s curriculum. As part of the online learning experience, virtual students will have the opportunity to attend live lessons with their academic teachers.

ESE/504

All students are required to follow the instructional policies enforced at VOL. Students have access to many accommodations that naturally occur in the virtual setting. VOL may be able to provide additional accommodations per a student’s IEP or Section 504 Plan if the accommodation(s) is/are applicable to the online educational environment. Please note that some accommodations may not be possible to implement in the online educational setting.

Testing Requirements

All Florida students are required to participate in state testing requirements at their zoned schools. Parents/guardians will be provided specific dates and times for state testing in advance. Testing dates are mandated by the State of Florida and as such cannot be altered by the school district. Failure to attend required testing dates could result in removal from Volusia Online Learning. Additional information will be shared information from our office as well as the zoned school.

Discussion Based Assessments (DBAs)

Each teacher regularly conducts Discussion Based Assessments (DBAs) with his or her students. These conversations occur at specific intervals, as well as randomly, in a course and are included in the assessment component of each course. Students must turn in course work in sequential order. During a DBA, the teacher discusses individual student work and extends the conversation to allow the student to demonstrate mastery of the content and to verify the authenticity of the student’s work. Students must complete and pass all discussion-based assessments independently, free from any distraction or influence of others. Students are provided multiple opportunities to demonstrate their learning through discussion-based assessments. A student who does not complete and pass required discussion-based assessments in their course is ineligible for course credit.

Academic Integrity

House Bill 7063 Digital Learning Act signed into Law and in effect as of July 1, 2012. The bill provides that it is unlawful for any person to knowingly and willfully take an online course or examination on behalf of another person for compensation.

Students in Volusia Online Learning agree to submit 100% of their own work upon registering for our courses. If a student finishes a segment in an extremely accelerated pace, they may be subject to additional accountability measures. Failure to comply with the Academic Integrity commitment or refusing to take a proctored exam will be grounds for removal from Volusia Online Learning.

Do not cut, copy, or plagiarize internet content or the work of your online classmates. Instructors utilize technologies to check for authenticity. Copying, knowingly allowing others to copy from you, and/or misusing internet content could result in removal from your course.

Any action taken with the intention of obtaining credit for work which is not one's own is considered academic dishonesty. The action may include, but is not limited to, the following:

- Submitting another student's work as one's own work.
- Obtaining or accepting a copy of tests or scoring devices.
- Giving or obtaining test questions or answers from a member of another class.
- Copying from another student's test or computer file or allowing another student to copy during a test or computer program.
- Using materials which are not permitted during a test.
- Plagiarism (presenting as one's own material copied without adequate documentation from a published source). ***See more information below**
- Copying or having someone other than the student prepare the student's homework, paper, project, laboratory report, computer program or take-home test for which credit is given.
- Accessing restricted computer files without teacher authorization.
- Copying materials including computer software, in violation of the copyright law.

Consequence: The instructor has the right to reduce the grade, schedule a conference with the parent/guardian and/or refer to administration.

Plagiarism Violations: After students watch a video (<https://youtu.be/VnTPv9PtOoo>) displaying the many different ways plagiarism/cheating can happen, students should understand the definition, examples, and policy surrounding plagiarism. A certain amount of coaching from the teacher is expected to teach the students about what plagiarism is and the implications of plagiarizing. Parents/Guardians and student will be contacted with each instance of plagiarism. The following are the consequences when a student is caught plagiarizing work:

1st offense: Warning, zero on the assignment, redo the assignment for full credit

2nd offense: Zero on the assignment, redo the assignment and can only get a maximum grade of 80% B

3rd offense: Zero on the assignment, redo the assignment and can only get a maximum grade of 70% C, School Counselor is contacted, and a Parent/Teacher conference is scheduled

4th offense: Zero on the assignment, redo the assignment and can only get a maximum grade of 60% D

All future offenses: Zero on the assignment is permanent with no opportunity to redo the work, School Counselor is contacted with any future offenses, and proper student placement in an online course will be discussed

Full-time VOL Student Attendance Policy

All children who have attained the age of six or who will have attained the age of six by February 1 of any year are required to attend school regularly during the entire school term. Children who will have attained the age of five years on or before September 1 of the school year are eligible for admission to public kindergartens during that school year under rules adopted by the district school board. Any child who has attained the age of six years on or before September 1 of the school year and who has been enrolled in a public school or who has attained the age of six years on or before September 1 and has satisfactorily completed the requirements for Kindergarten shall progress according to the district's student progression plan. A student who attains the age of 16 years during the school year is not subject to compulsory school attendance beyond the date upon which he/she attains that age if the student files a formal declaration of intent to terminate school enrollment with the district school board. The school district must notify the student's parent of receipt of the student's declaration of intent to terminate school enrollment. Section 1003.21, Florida Statute.

Required Instructional Hours

To meet the state's requirements, families are expected to have their student complete the following minimum hours of schooling each week:

Grade(s)	Expected Hours Per School Day	Expected Hours Per Week	Expected Hours Per Year
K - 3	4	20	720
4 - 12	5	25	900

Note that these are the minimum hours required by the state and that students are responsible for mastering all material, which may require additional time.

A student demonstrating adequate participation (and therefore progress) in school is based on several criteria and is a combination of measures. These measures include the student daily logins, course percentage completion, and amount of communication with the teacher. Students are expected to submit assignments in each course every week school is in session. A student is in good academic standing based on weekly progress and work submissions as defined by course pace charts and percent complete, as well as regular communication with teachers. Therefore, failure to make adequate weekly progress and/or regular communication with teachers, in all courses, may place the student at risk for disenrollment.

Disenrollment Due to Insufficient Student Engagement

In order to maximize student learning, consistent progress is imperative. VOL Full Time offers a great deal of flexibility regarding how many hours students spend each day on schoolwork and on what days of the week they complete that work. Due to this flexibility, VOL Full Time expects student progress.

Parent/guardians are responsible for ensuring their student is fully participating in school. The information below is intended to help parent/guardians support their student's progress. A student may be disenrolled for not making academic progress. This includes nonattendance and insufficient student engagement. The school will work with the family to help the student engage in weekly learning to improve his/her progress, through targeted tiered interventions provided by teachers. If these efforts fail and adequate progress is not made, the student will be escalated to a School Counselor and administrator, which could lead to the student's official disenrollment.

In order to maintain progress, the parent/guardian must ensure that the following activities are taking place:

- The student completes assigned lessons and assessments on a weekly basis.

- The student participates in educational activities for an appropriate number of hours, as outlined in the Required Instructional Hours (p. 19).
- The student maintains at least monthly telephone contacts with teachers.
- The student attends all required Live Lessons.
- The student is able to demonstrate that he/she is doing his/her own schoolwork.
- The student attends and completes all mandatory district and state testing.
- The parent/guardian has communicated with the homeroom teacher in advance if he/ she needs to deviate from the regular school calendar (for example, switching a vacation and school day).

Truancy

Florida law defines "habitual truant" as a student who has 15 or more unexcused absences within 90 calendar days with or without the knowledge or consent of the student's parent or guardian, and who is subject to compulsory school attendance. Due to the unique online educational environment at FLVS Full Time, 15 unexcused absences may be equivalent to 15 or more school days in which the student has not completed any work and has not responded to communication attempts made by a designated Teacher, designated School Administrator, and/ or School Social Worker. When a truancy concern arises, the Student Support team will convene to determine interventions that may need to be implemented to support student/family needs. If students/families are nonresponsive to these attempts, then local law enforcement may be contacted to perform a well-being check. As a last resort, a student may be withdrawn/disenrolled from FLVS Full Time for truancy if the student is not completing any work or responding to communication attempts.

Attendance Requirements for Students to Maintain their Driving Privilege

Minors between the ages of 14 and 18 years of age who do not attend school regularly will not be issued a learner's permit or will have their driving privilege suspended by the Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles. Section 322.091, Florida Statute. VOL Full Time will report all students between the ages of 14 and 18 years of age who accumulate 15 unexcused absences within a period of 90 calendar days to the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles (DHSMV). VOL Full Time is also required to report all students who withdraw from school as a dropout. This notification to the DHSMV initiates one of two actions: The DHSMV will post a Notice of Intent to suspend driving privileges to the driver record of all reported licensed students.

- **Apple Mac OS users:** Please note our programs do NOT accept files from Apple software products such as Apple Pages. You will need to download and install Microsoft Office products or use a converter.

Computer components also needed for virtual learning include:

- Microphone (internal or headset with mic)
- Webcam
- Printer with a supply of ink and paper (highly recommended)
- Scanner or cell phone to use for uploading course assignments.

In addition to the tech requirements, we also highly recommend having a quiet and organized workspace for your child. You will also need to purchase the items on the supply lists for both the core and elective courses. Those lists will be supplied at the beginning of the school year.

Virtual Code of Conduct

Internet access is required for all Volusia Online Learning students, but access must be used in a responsible, safe, efficient, ethical, and legal manner. With expanded access to electronic information, availability of inappropriate material is not uncommon. Some sites contain illegal, defamatory, inaccurate, or offensive information. Although it is impossible to control such misuse, we believe that with responsible use, the benefits of the internet as an educational tool outweigh the negative. We strive to partner with parents to teach responsible internet use. The following rules should be followed:

- Students are responsible for good behavior on any network, just as they are in a traditional school. It is illegal to use obscene, profane, threatening, or disrespectful language. (F.S. 874.001 Obscene Literature; Profanity)
- It is illegal to create harmful computer viruses. (F.S. 815 Computer-Related Crimes)
- Email is not private. Never say anything via email that you wouldn't mind seeing on the school bulletin board or in the local newspaper.
- Beware of emails from anyone, particularly adults you don't know, asking for personal information, attempting to arrange meetings, or engaging in personal contact. Alert your administrator or a teacher from Volusia Online Learning of any message you receive that is inappropriate or makes you feel uncomfortable.
- Inappropriate Texting/Messaging including photographs or videos sent via computer, cell phones, or any other electronic device which depict nudity, or any other inappropriate content are prohibited. (F.S. 847.001 Sexting)
- Dress Code Policy: When attending online meetings, clothing that exposes underwear or body parts in an indecent or vulgar manner or that disrupts the orderly learning environment is not permitted.
- Volusia Online Learning assumes no responsibility for any phone charges, line costs or usage fees for connectivity to the internet.
- Students and Learning Coaches are responsible for their behaviors and are expected to comply with the Technology Acceptable Use and Student Code of Conduct of Volusia County Schools.
- Communication will follow professional standards. Offensive messages or pictures will not be sent, displayed, or downloaded; District harassment policy applies.
- Users of technology resources will respect the rights and privacy of others. Each student will only use his/her assigned password/ID and will not trespass into files, folders, or work of other users. Teachers and Administration do have the right to access the work and district issued computers of students in their classes as it pertains to the class. Students will not allow other persons to access the computers or networks using his/her password/ID.
- Copyright laws will be respected. All quotations, references, graphics, video clips, digital music, and other information will be cited to give credit to the originator.
- Impersonating another person is strictly prohibited.
- Do not publicly post your personal contact information (address and phone number) or anyone else's private information.

Parent/Guardian Code of Conduct for Volusia Online Learning

Volusia Online Learning is a school within the Volusia County School district. As a result, the following behaviors are considered violations of the Parent/Guardian Code of Conduct as they interrupt the learning environment. When parents/guardians or other adults in the household engage in any of the below behaviors which can be seen or heard during classroom instruction, the consequences may result in a child being removed from Volusia Online Learning.

- Use of profanity
- Inappropriate clothing (e.g., clothing with offensive language, lack of clothing, or clothing with messages or symbols that disrupt the learning environment)
- Inappropriate gestures
- Yelling at student(s)
- Excessively loud background noise from TV, radio, people or pets in home etc. that impacts others' ability to listen to the teacher
- Raising voice at teacher or otherwise demonstrating disrespect
- Bullying or ridiculing of students
- Sharing information regarding specific students (e.g., disability status or other information) with others
- Disrupting the teacher or students verbally or physically
- Illegal activities

Consequences for violations of above are as follows: for the parents??

- 1st Offense: Conference with parent/guardian and student
- 2nd Offense: Conference with parent/guardian and student
- 3rd Offense: Student will receive a referral on their permanent record
- Any Code of Student Conduct violation of Level 3 and above will automatically result in the student being returned to the traditional brick and mortar setting, and disciplinary decisions will be determined
- Observation of illegal activity will result in a referral to law enforcement. The Department of Children and Families (DCF) may also be contacted in certain circumstances

Note: While it is the responsibility of the virtual teacher to provide instruction to students in Volusia Online Learning it is not the teacher's responsibility to supervise students whose parents/guardians have selected Volusia Online Learning. As a result, please ensure that your child is appropriately supervised by an adult whenever possible while participating in their virtual classes. Supervision by the parent/guardian includes supervising students while using technology to ensure that inappropriate sites are not accessed. If an older sibling/student is supervising a younger student, please ensure that this role is not interfering with the older sibling's ability to engage in their instruction. Student engagement is an important component of Volusia Online Learning and we expect and appreciate the efforts that parents/guardians put forth to address student engagement, including a workplace free of distractions for the student(s).
